

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I. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

This paper presents a general overview of services to residents of the Northwest Territories and brief profiles of the four impact communities of Arctic Bay, Grise Fiord, Pond Inlet and Resolute Bay.

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11. <u>OVERVIEW OF SERVICE CATEGORIES AND GOVERNMENT</u> <u>DEPARTMENTS</u>

In this section services available to residents of the Northwest Territories (NWT) are categorized, and the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and federal departments which deliver the services are listed. The services have been grouped into eight categories:

- 1. Employment
- 2. Financial
- 3. Health
- 4. Security
- 5. Social Services
- 6. Transfer of information
- 7. Transportation
- 8. Miscellaneous public services.

These categories have been set up based on the type of service delivered, rather than the identity of the government department or agency which is the supplier. In order to place the deliverers of service in their proper governmental niche, it is necessary to be aware of the framework of both the Government of the Northwest Territories and the federal government presence in the Northwest Territories.

The GNWT is divided into the following departments:

- 1. Economic Development and Tourism
- 2. Education
- 3. Finance
- 4. Government Services
- 5. Health
- 6. Information
- 7. Justice and Public Services
- 8. Local government
- 9. Personnel

- 10. Public Works
- 11. Renewable Resources
- 12. Social Services

The GNWT also provides services to the Territorial residents through the following :

- 1. NWT Housing Corporation
- 2. Liquor Control System
- 3. Workers Compensation Board

The federal government is a provider of service through the following:

- 1. Employment and Immigration Canada
- 2. National Health and Welfare
- 3. Indian Affairs and Northern Development
- 4. Post Office
- 5. Public Service Commission
- 6. RCMP
- 7. Solicitor General
- 8. Transport Canada

In many cases there is cooperation between the federal and territorial governments. This has a historic basis. Prior to 1954 the federal government was solely responsible for the delivery of services to residents of the NWT. In 1954 a "Memorandum of Understanding" came into effect which laid the foundation for the transfer from federal to territorial responsibility. This transfer is still in the process of taking place.

Within the local communities there are a number of committees which assist in the delivery or implementation of various services. Where these committees are involved decisions concerning the type of service and form of delivery are community-based.

111. POLICY DEVELOPMENT AND TERMS OF REFERENCE

This section briefly outlines the policy development process within each government department, and where possible identifies key individuals involved. Implicit in the policy formation process is the involvement of the responsible minister. The terms of reference affecting each department or agency are also identified. The overriding legislation for all GNWT departments is the NWT Act.

A. <u>Government of the Northwest Territories Departments and Agencies</u>

1. Economic Development and Tourism

Minister: Tom Butters (403) 873-7128

Policy for the department is developed through the Economic Development Secretariat (Swam Upal (403) 873-7370); Planning and Resource Development Division (Chief - Don Weisbeck (403) 873-7318).

Legislation that affects this department includes the GNWT Apprentices and Tradesmen Ordinance and the federal Adult Occupational **Training Act.** Other information is unavailable at present.

2. <u>Education</u>

Minister: Dennis Patterson (403) 873-7959

There is a general system of regional policy development. Eric Colbourne (819) 979-5236) is Regional Superintendent of Education in Frobisher Bay. The Deputy Minister, Brian Lewis (403) 873-7351, 5729), has overall responsibility. Policy is approved by executive committee of the NWT government. The Department of Education operates under the authority of the Education Ordinance.

3. Finance

Minister: Tom Butters (403) 873-7128 Documentation for policy development **is** handled through the Financial Systems and Training Sections (Manager: Rick **Feil**; (403) 873-7305, 7528). It then goes through the Assistant Deputy Minister (Jim Nelson; (403) 873-7338) to the Deputy Minister (Eric Nielsen; (403) 873-7117) to the Financial Management Board.

4. <u>Government Services</u>

Minister: Kane Tologanak (403) 873-7962

At the time of writing there **is** no policy and planning section of this department. Policy is developed from the line managers through the hierarchy to the Deputy Minister from whom **it is** presented to the Policy and Planning Secretariat of the Executive.

Other than the NWT Act, the Department of Government Services operates under the Financial Administration Ordinance Regulation.

5. <u>Health</u>

Minister: Arnold McCallum (403) 873-7658 There is a Health Coordinating Committee which provides direction in terms of policy for the department. It is composed of representatives from the GNWT Department of Health and the federal department of National Health and Welfare, Medical Services Branch. At the present time the members of this committee are as follows:

- 2. Medical Services Branch:

A task force on Health Service Delivery and Policy Coordination, composed of representatives from GNWT Department of Health, federal Medical Services Branch, and **DIAND** is also providing policy direction. Peter Owen (Program Policy Officer, (403) 873-7791) is a GNWT Department of Health representative on this task force.

The original document governing delivery of health services in the NWT was the 1954 Memorandum of Understanding. The present document is entitled "Lead Responsibilities. "

The T. H.I. s. Board operates under the authority of T. H. 1. S. Ordinance.

6. Information

Director: Art Sorenson (403) 873-7442 There are no specific ordinances under which this department operates.

Policy formation is initiated within the department through senior management and the Director (Art Sorenson; (403) 873-7442) and through their Executive Member John Parker (403) 873-7400.

7. Justice and Public Services

Minister: George Braden (403) 873-7123

At the present time this department is looking at a position for a policy person, but there has been no approval yet. Thus policy is being developed through the line management to the Deputy Minister (Stein Lal (403) 873-7453).

While there is no specific ordinance under which the department as a whole operates, different sections are involved in the enforcement of a number of ordinances: the NWT Industrial Safety Regulations and Ordinance, the

Electrical Protection Ordinance, Boiler and Pressure Vessels Ordinance, Fire Prevention Ordinance, Petroleum Ordinance, Mining Safety Ordinance, the Historical Resources Ordinance, Explosives Use Ordinance, Fair Practices Ordinance, Labour Standards Ordinance, and the Public Service Vehicles Ordinance. The department also administers the NWT Act and Archeological Site Regulations on behalf of DIAND.

8. Local Government

Minister: James Wah-Shee (403) 873-7139, 7140

The Department of Local Government operates under a number of pieces of legislation both Territorial and Federal. The Territorial ordinances involved are the Municipal Ordinance, the Commissioner's Land Ordinance, the Area Development Ordinance, the Taxation Ordinance and the Planning Ordinance. The major federal ordinances are the Environment Protection Ordinance, the Public Health Ordinance, the Territorial Lands Act and the Federal Aeronautical Act.

The policy development process works through individual department managers and is coordinated through the Planning and Policy Division (Chief: Louise Vertes (403) 873-7727). Ultimately it is the Deputy Minister (Mike Moore (403) 873-71 18) who makes the recommendation to the Minister.

9. <u>Personnel</u>

Director: Ted Boyer (403) 873-7310, 7617

Individual managers develop policy through the preparation of proposals. These are handled through the Planning and Priorities Secretariat. The Senior Policy Advisor is Peter Allen (403) 873-7334). The Secretariat makes recommendations to the Commission through the responsible Minister (George Braden, Minister of Justice and Public Services (403) 873-7123).

The Department of Personnel operates under the Public Service Ordinance.

10. Public Works

Deputy Minister, Larry **Elkin** (403) 8737114 Information not available at the time of writing. .

11. <u>Renewable Resources</u>

Minister: Richard Nerysoo (403) 873-7113

The key people involved in policy development within this department are the five regional superintendents: [Cambridge Bay, Dave Brackett (983-2139); Fort Smith, Len Colosimo (403-872-2023); Inuvik, Doug Stewart (403-979-7232); Frobisher Bay, Don Boxer, (819-979-5703); and Rankin inlet, vacant, (819-645-3856)]; the Chief of Wildlife Services in Yellowknife, Hugh Monaghan (403-873-7411); the Chief of Environmental Planning and Assessment, John Donihee (403-873-7768); the Assistant Deputy Minister, Norm Simmons (403-873-7420); the Deputy Minister, Jim Bourque (403-873-7420) and the Minister. Local groups often are involved where there is potential socio-economic impact.

The terms of reference of the department include the Wildlife Ordinance, the Environmental Protection Ordinance, and the Scientists Ordinance. The department also uses Various **pieces** of federal **legislation** as guidelines.

12. <u>Social Services</u>

Minister: Arnold McAllum (403) 873-7658 Policy is developed through the Policy and Planning Division. Chief of this division is Gwen Ewan (403) 873-7707).

This department operates under three major GNWT Ordinances:

- 1. Child Welfare
- 2. Social Assistance
- 3. Corrections

13. NWT Housing Corporation

President: Vic Irving (403) 873-7850

Policy is developed by the eleven members of the Board of Directors of the Corporation. Robert S. Pilot (403) 873-7112) is the chairperson. The Corporation operates under the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation Ordinance.

14. Liquor Control System

General Manager: Ed Pugh, Hay River (403) 874-2100

The Liquor Control System operates under the Liquor Ordinance. This Ordinance allows for Local Options (i. e. individual communities can make the decision to be "dry" or "wet"); thus this aspect of policy is developed on a local community basis. Other aspects of policy are developed through the line management of the system, going through the General Manager to the Executive Committee.

15. Workers' Compensation Board

Chairman: John D. C. MacLean (403) 873-7555 The Board operates under the Workers' Compensation Board Ordinance.

B. <u>Government of Canada Departments</u>

1. Employment and Immigration Canada

The NWT Directorate of the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission is the active agency in the NWT. Its director is Gilles Patenaude (403) 920-8411).

While policy in general terms originates in Ottawa, there is some regional leeway. The regional input is met through the Manpower Needs Committee, composed of representatives of the GNWT (Deputy Minister Economic Development and Tourism: Rod Morrison (403) 873-7115 - he is leaving on June 4, 1982 - replacement unknown at this time; Deputy Minister Education: Brian Lewis, (403) 873-7351, 7529); and of the Employment

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and Immigration Commission (the Director: Gilles Patenaude (403) 920-8411; Acting Manager - Training Branch and Territorial Relations: Brian Carr (403) 920-8447); as well as other individuals as required.

Other than the Immigration Act and the Unemployment Insurance Act, the governing legislation for the Commission is the Adult Occupational Training Act. New legislation has been drafted and is planned to be before the House in June, 1982.

2. National Health and Welfare

The individual responsible for services in the NWT is the Regional Director of the Medical **Services** Branch: Dr. David Martin (403) 873-7025). The overall responsibility for policy is in Ottawa at the Branch level. The Assistant Deputy Minister is Dr. L. Black.

The original document covering delivery of health services in the NWT was the 1954 Memorandum of Understanding. The present document is entitled "Lead Responsibilities. " This department also administers the Public Health Ordinance for the GNWT.

3. **DIAND**

Functions of DIAND in the NWT are split between the Indian and Inuit Affairs Program (Regional Director, Conrad Pilon (403) 920-8284), and the Northern Affairs Program (Regional Director, Hiram Bouvier (⁴⁰³) 920-8111). The basic legislation affecting the Indian and Inuit Affairs Program is the Indian Act. The Northern Affairs Program is involved with Canada Mining Regulations, Canada Oil and Gas Production and Conservation Act, the Northern Inland Waters Act, the Territorial Lands Act, and the Land Titles Act.

Policy is an Ottawa responsibility. Dan Goodleaf (613) 994-3110) is Director of Program Planning and Policy Coordination for the Indian and Inuit Affairs Program; John Hucker (613) 997-9510) is the Director of Northern Policy and Planning for the Northern Affairs Program.

4. **Post Office**

Overall responsibility for postal service in the western NWT lies with the Area Manager in Edmonton: Gordon Patterson (403) 420-3083). At the time of writing it was not possible to ascertain his eastern counterpart.

The Post Office, as a Crown Corporation, now comes under the Canada Labour Code.

5. Public Service Commission

Acting Director: M. Lament (403) 873-3525 Generally speaking policy development originates in Ottawa, although there is some regional involvement.

6. <u>RCMP</u>

Commanding Officer "G" Division: c/supt . Hugh A. Feagan (403) 920-8322.

In practice, policy appears to be developed through initiatives both from the GNWT Department of Justic and Public Services (Deputy Minister Stein Lal (403) 873-7453) and the RCMP (Planning Section, S/Sgt. Jim Scott (403) 920-8352) .

The RCMP operate under the authority of the RCMP Act. Their contract with GNWT is covered by Section 20 of the RCMP Act and Section 15 of the NWT Act.

7. <u>Solicitor Genera</u>l (Parole Service) (403) 873-8411

8. <u>Transport Canada</u>

Arctic Transportation Directorate (403) 873-5380.

IV. SERVICES AVAILABLE TO RESIDENTS OF THE NWT

In this section the eight categories of service available to residents of the NWT are dealt with, including a description of the services provided and identification of the individuals involved.

EMPLOYMENT

Services which fall under the category of employment involve the development of employment for northerners. They overlap with some of the services considered under the category of transfer of knowledge, as most of them contain a considerable educational or training component.

The Government of the Northwest Territories is involved in the delivery of employment services through the Departments of Personnel, and Economic Development and Tourism. The Government of Canada is also involved through the Canadian Employment and Immigration Commission and the Federal Public Service Commission.

Within the GNWT Department of Personnel the Office of Native Employment is a section under the Staff Development and Training Division, whose Chief is David Sproule (403) 873-7934). The position of Coordinator of the Office of Native Employment is vacant at the time of writing. Through this section native people are encouraged to join the GNWT Public Service, to develop both their personal potential and a public service career.

The Manpower Development Division of the Department of Economic Development and Tourism is the major GNWT supplier of employment services to northerners.

The present Minister of Economic Development and Tourism is Tom Butters (403) 873-7128) . Essentially there are two sections within the Manpower Development Division of this Department which are responsible for the delivery of employment services to northern residents: the Employment

Development section and the Apprenticeship Program section. Brian Carr is Chief of the Manpower Development Division (403) 873-7553), as well as Acting Head of the Apprenticeship Program (403) 873-7372). Head 'of the Employment Development Section is Russ Look (403) 873-7614).

In this area, as in others, there is cooperation between the federal government and that of the Northwest Territories. A case in point is the GNWT Training on the Job Program. Canada Employment and Immigration, through the Canada Manpower Industrial Training Program supply the funding and are assisted in the administration by the GNWT Manpower Development Division. Bill Carr is the Manager of the Industrial Training Branch of the Northwest Territories Directorate of Canada Employment and Immigration (403) 920-8447). This Training on the Job Program focuses on small business and the service industry. Because funding is limited, it cannot provide support for larger projects.

Federal involvement in the delivery of employment services is also carried out through the Northern Careers Program of the Federal Public Service Commission. This program offers opportunities for the development of careers within the Federal public service in the Northwest Territories (403) 873-3545).

FINANCIAL

The GNWT Department of Economic Development and Tourism (Minister: Tom Butters (403) 873-7128) is the major supplier of financial services to northern residents. Financial services in this context refer essentially to funding access. Assistance in the **form** of expertise and training is also available. This latter aspect will be covered in the section on Transfer of Knowledge.

The following are administered by the financial services section (Head: Bert Reaburn, (403) 873-7516) of the GNWT Department of Economic Development and Tourism:

- 1. The NWT Eskimo loan fund
- 2. Small business loans and guarantees fund
- 3. GNWT portion of the Special ARDA program (under joint Federal/Territorial agreement)

Funding requests in excess of loan limits have been processed on a joint venture basis with the Federal Business Development Bank.

The GNWT Department of Renewable Resources (Minister, Richard Nerysoo, (403) 873-7113) through the Wildlife Service (Superintendent, Norm Simmons (403) 873-7411) offers a number of financial assistance programs to wildlife users through consultation with the hunters' and trappers' associations:

gasoline subsidy for hunters and trappers
fur incentive subsidies
trappers' assistance loans
outpost camp grants
grants to hunters' and trappers' associations

The GNWT Department of Local Government (Minister, James Wah Shee (403) 873-7140) has instituted a homeowners' tax rebate program for resident owners living in a city, town or village. A private homeowner service connection grant has also been initiated whereby private homeowners may receive financial assistance to install piped water/sewer service connections if conversion of an area of a community to piped services is economically desirable. The Town Planning and Lands Division (Chief Al Menard, (403) 873-7425) administers this grant.

Some financial services are available in northern communities through the Hudson's Bay Company (e.g. transfer of funds from one location to another). In the larger centres, chartered banks provide the same type of services available in Southern Canada.

Financial assistance in the form of grants and bursaries is available to all northern residents who wish to attend university or technical programs, depending on the number of years spent in the NWT school system. The GNWT Department of Education provides this assistance through the Students Grants and Bursaries Board (Urban Superintendent, M. S. Naidoo , (403) 873-7355).

The Workers' Compensation Board deals with the provision of recompense to workers for wage loss due to disability from personal injury by accident arising out of employment. The Chairman is John D. C. MacLean (403) 873-7555).

HEALTH

The delivery of health services to northern residents is accomplished through the federal Department of National Health and Welfare, Medical Services Branch; and the GNWT Department of Health. Dr. David Martin is the Regional Director of the Medical Services branch in Yellowknife (403) 873-7025). Arnold McCallum is Minister of Health for the Government of the Northwest Territories (403) 873-7658). Health services in this context refer to the following facets of service:

- 1. Preventive
- 2. Acute

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- 3. Chronic
- 4. Insurance Programs

Under the 1954 "Memorandum of Understanding" the federal Medical Services Branch ("Meal. Services") has been the provider of service while the Government of the Northwest Territories has been in the process of developing its own system and expertise. In the years since 1954 the GNWT Department of Health has been working toward the goal of being able to deliver health services. At the present time health service delivery is a complicated welter of transfer and contractual agreement. Essentially, "Meal. Services" provides preventive services in all Northwest Territories communities and acute services in all communities except Yellowknife, Hay River, and Fort Smith. In the latter cases services are provided by GNWT Department of Health. The hospital in Frobisher Bay is in the process of being transferred on contractual arrangements from If the hospital transfer "Meal. Services" to GNWT Department of Health. works out, the proposal is to turn the nursing stations in the Baffin regions over to the GNWT Department of Health. This plan is conditional upon support from the Baffin Regional Council, which at the time of writing is reported to be forthcoming.

At the present time a task force on Health Service Delivery and Policy Coordination is looking at the whole spectrum of health services in the Northwest Territories, from **the** aspects of Planning, **coordination** and evaluation. The task force is making recommendations about relationships, and establishing clear guidelines for the development of health services. The report of this task force is due in the fall of 1982. The GNWT **Department** of Health, "Meal. Services" and the federal DIAND are represented on the task force. Insurance for hospital, medical travel, physician and laboratory services is available to residents of the Northwest Territories, through the Territorial Hospital Insurance Services (THIS), Territorial Health Care plan, and supplementary services. These are administered by the GNWT Department of Health, Health Insurance Programs, (Temporary Administrator, Marnie Shopa (403) 873-7152).

served by modern, well-equipped, Most northern communities are well-staff ed nursing stations. There are hospitals in the larger communities. Physicians from the larger communities make regular trips to communities with nursing stations, and residents requiring the services of specialists are referred either to northern communities where the required service is available, or sent to southern Canada when necessary. Those requiring care not available from the local nursing station are evacuated by air using local carriers to the nearest facility which can provide the necessary care.

Dental services are provided through National Health and Welfare. Some communities have resident dental therapists; most are visited on a regular basis by dentists.

Other health services are provided by the following:

- 1. Health educators (National Health and Welfare);
- Community health representatives (at present with National Health and Welfare; administration and funding may soon come through GNWT Department of Health);

- 3. Family Life Educators (GNWT Department of Health operating with grant from National Health and Welfare, Family Planning Division);
- 4. Health Promotion Officer (GNWT Department of Health);
- 5. Northern Addiction Services (GNWT Social Services);

6. Occupational health (Safety Division; GNWT Department of Justice and Public Services).

SECURITY

Security as dealt with here covers the areas of policing, fire safet \hat{y} , and industrial safety. The latter two aspects come under the authority of the GNWT, Department of Justice and Public Services, Safety Division. The Chief of the Safety Division is Robbie Robinson (403) 873-7430).

Policing is carried out under contract between the GNWT Department of Justice and Public Services and the RCMP "G" Division with Headquarters in Yellowknife: CO: C/Supt. Hugh A. Feagan (403) 920-8322). There are RCMP detachments in most northern communities.

With regard to fire safety, most local communities are served by trained volunteers equipped with fire fighting vehicles and equipment geared to community size. The Fire Safety Section (Head: Les McPhee (403) 873-7469) of the Safety Division of the GNWT Department of Justice and Public Services administers the Fire Prevention Ordinance and regulations.

Industrial safety is dealt with by Occupational Health (Laurie Nowakowski (403) 873-7468) of the Safety Division of the GNWT Department of Justice and Public Services.

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SOCIAL SERVICES

Social services are made available to residents of the NWT through the GNWT Department of Social Services. The present minister is Arnold **McCallum** (403) 873-7658).

The following services are offered through this department.

- 1. Financial assistance program (Coordinator: G. Richard Clarke; (403) 873-7160);
- 2. family and children's services (Supt. of Child Welfare: Mrs. Diane Doyle; (403) 873-7709);
- 3. services to the aged and handicapped (Coordinator: Diane Doyle; (403) 873-7708);
- 4. corrections (Chief: Stan Mounsey; (403) 873-7212);
- 5. alcohol and drugs (Coordinator: Winnie Fraser-McKay; (403) 873-7155).

The GNWT Department of Social Services, Corrections Division, also acts for the Government of Canada in the following areas:

1. Parole

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- 2. Juvenile delinquency
- 3. Probation

Further services carried out unofficially on behalf of the federal government include those related to the following:

- 1. Old age pensions
- 2. Family allowance
- 3. Other categorical services of the federal government.

Most northern communities have resident **social** workers. It **is** by **virtue** of their presence in the communities that they unofficially carry out federal duties.

TRANSFER OF INFORMATION

Transfer of Information is a broad category which includes the traditional aspects of education, but **also** encompasses job- or career-oriented training and dissemination of information.

The GNWT Departments of Education and Personnel have been the main suppliers of this type of service to **northern** residents, but most other GNWT departments have some training component included within their structure. The present minister of Education is Dennis Patterson (403) 873-7959); the GNWT Department of Personnel reports to the Commissioner, John H. Parker (403) 873-7400). The present Director of the Department of Personnel is Ted Boyer (403) 873-7310, 7617).

A special Committee on Education, Tradition and Learning in the North has prepared a report with more than 40 recommendations to be presented to the Legislative Assembly in May, 1982. The Executive Director is Jack Loughton (403) 873-7922). The objective is to develop a single agency responsible for all types of education in the Northwest Territories, including school-based education, training for resource development, preparation for dealing with the impact of resource development, etc. . At the present time this function resides with the GNWT Department of Personnel; the recommendation is for the GNWT Education to house the agency.

Services supplied through the GNWT **Department of Education**, Programs and Evaluations Branch, (Administrator, Fred Carnew (403) 873-7234) include the following:

- 1. Special and remedial education: Coordinator, Bronwyn Watters (403) 873-7441.
- 2. Academic programs: Coordinator, Ken Norton (403) 873-7458.
- 3. Vocational programs: Coordinator, Gerry Gill (403) 873-7677.
- 4. Career and post secondary programs: Program specialist, Frank Pinkman (403) 873-7678.

- 5. Technical and business programs: Program specialist, Norman Mair (403) 873-7677.
- 6. Inuktitut language programs: Program Specialist, Susan Hyde (403) 873-7689.
- Athabaskan language programs: Program specialist, vacant (403) 873-7692 (may be filled by Fibbi Tatti).
- 8. Student loans and bursaries board: Urban superintendent, M. S. Naidoo (403) 873-7355.

TRANSPORTATION
