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

May we suggest that most of your fish go back in the water, alive? Because here, it's common to land hundreds in a single week, with perhaps a dozen trophies among your catch. We





ARCTIC FISHES



ARCTIC CHAR

Like its cousin the lake trout, Arctic Char is a tasty northern delicacy with distinctive reddish flesh, somewhat like salmon. Found from Baffin Island west to the border of Yukon, char are caught in coastal rivers, generally after mid-July when they head inland, after a summer feeding at sea. The largest catch so far weighed over 30 pounds. Fifteen-pounders are common in some rivers, but the average is usually five to seven pounds.

LAKE TROUT

The Lake Trout is found throughout the Mackenzie, Thelon, Back and Coppermine drainage systems, including Great Bear and Great Slave Lake. They are caught in shallow water in spring and fall and in deep, cold water in summer. The largest trophy recorded is a 65-pound lunker from Great Bear Lake. Many others have come close and 20-pounders are common. Their yellowish flesh is delicious eating, straight from the lake.

GREAT NORTHERN PIKE

Great Northern Pike are abundant throughout the drainage systems of the mainland Northwest Territories and particularly in the Great Slave Lake area. They weigh between five and 15 pounds, but quite a few 30-and 40-pounders have been taken. Excellent fighters, they are most often found in weedy shallow streams and lakes. They have a delicate flavor and firm white flesh

LAKE WHITEFISH

Averaging from three to five pounds, lake whitefish are prized as exceptionally good eating. Normally caught with a baited hook, or fly, they are found in most lakes across the NWT. Whitefish have small mouths, and are delicate feeders, giving the sport fishing community a challenge, particularly with a fly rod.

ARCTIC GRAYLING

Arctic Grayling is a true northern fish. It is common in the Mackenzie, Coppermine, Anderson, Thelon and Back drainages. Grayling is one of the world's most beautiful fish and a fine and enthusiastic fighter, but they have small, tender mouths and can be difficult to land. They can often be found just below a rocky ledge in clear northern lakes and rivers.

WALLEYE


Also known as dore, pickerel or yellow pike perch, walleye is the largest member of the perch family. They are plentiful in smaller lakes around Hay River and Yellowknife. Like pike, they prefer shallow weedy areas, or deep clear water, and put up a spirited battle when hooked.

INCONNU


The largest member of the whitefish family, "coney" resembles a large herring with dark back, silvery sides and large scales. Inconnu average 9 to 20 pounds, although commercial fishermen report some over 70 pounds. They are most often caught on their migration to large lakes, in late summer, in wide muddy rivers in the Mackenzie area.





PLAY IT SAFE

PLAY IT SAFE

Whether you fish from a boat or the shore, it's wise to play it safe when dressing for the Northern outdoors.

Experienced outdoors people dress in layers, and carry an extra sweater or jacket, just in case. The proven types of clothing include good boots, wool or cotton trousers, and a couple of layers of wool or cotton shirts and sweaters. Cotton offers natural warmth and comfort when dry wool has an advantage because it retains 75 percent of body heat when it's wet. Whether it protects you from our day-long summer sunshine, or from wind and rain, a good, brimmed hat is essential. Now you're ready for adventure, no matter what the weather.

The major danger in the northern out-of-doors is hypothermia. It's caused by over-exposure to cold, wet or windy weather or immersion in cold water. Hypothermia can lead to clumsiness, unconsciouness and even death, as the body's inner temperature drops below 37°C.

HOW TO PREVENT HYPOTHERMIA

Being prepared for the cold is the only protection against hypothermia. Stay as dry as possible, and dress warmly, wearing several layers. Take a change of clothes with you in a waterproof bag, and carry a rainsuit or slicker.



SAFETY FIRST ON THE WATER

There's one safety rule everyone agrees on — wear an approved life-jacket or personal flotation device when travelling in a boat. It serves double duty in cold water, keeping you afloat, and keeping you warm. Your body loses heat faster in cold water than in the air.

IF THERE'S A BOATING EMERGENCY

- try to remain calm.
- stick with the group, and try to conserve body heat in a H.E.L.P. or group huddle position.
- never try to swim long distances.
- keep your clothes on to conserve heat.

SIGNS OF HYPOTHERMIA

- mild shivering, violent or uncontrollable shivering and fatigue.
- loss of co-ordination and confused or irrational behavior.
- severe difficulty speaking or performing complex tasks.
- stiffened muscles, unconsciousness, absence of reflexes.
- death can be caused by total heart and breathing failure when body temperature falls below 27°C.

WHAT TO DO

Mild Hypothermia

- allow victim to rest in a shelter near a source of heat such as a fire, or your own body heat.
- provide a change of dry clothes.
- warm sweet liquids may be given only if the victim is conscious and able to swallow without choking.
- warm baths can be dangerous. The victim's arms and legs should be kept out of the bath to prevent a sudden recirculation of the blood and risk of stress on the heart.

Severe Hypothermia

- send for medical help, if possible.
- place warm objects, heated, wrapped rocks, or a hot water bottle



near the head, neck, and chest.

- cover the victim with blankets or a sleeping bag wet clothing need not be removed if you can provide good insulation and a waterproof covering.
- donate your own body heat, if necessary, by wrapping yourself with the victim and warming the thest area.
- don't give up, even if the victim appears dead. There are many documented cases of 'lifeless' hypothermia victims being successfully revived, even after complete submersion in cold water for more than 20 minutes. Do not consider the victim dead until qualified medical personnel have attempted to revive him
- cigarettes and alcohol interfere with the rewarming process and should not be given to a hypothermia victim. Don't take unnecessary risks. Wear an approved lifejacket on the water. Avoid travelling over lake or sea ice in the late spring and early fall. ALWAYS let someone know where you have gone and when you expect to be back.

CATCH AND RELEASE

The Northwest Territories is world famous for its unspoiled lakes and rivers, almost too numerous to count and too many to name. Our cold, clear waters offer even the beginner the chance to pull in a trophy fish—we have a true sport fishing paradise here in the North.

To keep our waters well stocked with healthy fish, a "Catch and Release" program is in effect. Anglers are encouraged to release the fish they catch to be caught again. Here are a few hints that will help your fish live to challenge another fisherman.

Most mortalities among released fish occur because of excessive bleeding, when barbed hooks have been embedded in the gullet or gills. It's almost impossible to remove a barbed hook safely from these areas. We recommend that the barbs on your hooks be filed off or pinched down with pliers, allowing safe and harmless removal of the hook.

If you can avoid handling the fish when removing the hook, do so. Its slippery coating is a protection against disease. If not, grasp it firmly behind



the head, never in the eyes or gills. Twist the hook out gently with needle nosed pliers and put the fish back in the water. If the fish appears dazed, gently hold it upright in the water until it swims away.

Play it like a true sportsman. Carefully release your fish after the catch. You'll be helping to keep our waters a sportsman's paradise. And when you come back next year, you'll still find our fishing fabulous.

For information on catch, size and possession limits, consult the N.W.T. Sportfishing Guide, available where licences are sold.

ARCTIC ANGLER

You can fish the Northwest Territories and win an award for letting the fish go — to be caught again! Our Arctic Angler Certificates are awarded to good sportsmen who catch any fish that matches or exceeds the minimum weight requirements for that species. You don't need to kill the fish to qualify. Simply weigh and release it.

You can claim your Arctic Angler Award from TravelArctic, Government Regional Tourism Officers, and from participating lodges, outfitters and Tourism Industry Associations.
