1993 NVVT Campground User Survey — Profile of Campground Use —

Introduction

During summer 1993 the Bureau of Statistics and the Department of Economic Development and Tourism undertook a survey of NWT campground use. The survey was completed for a sample of sites at territorial campgrounds between June 15 and September 6.

The survey included NWT parks in four areas: three parks along **Ingraham** Trail and near **Yellowknife**; three parks in the **Inuvik** area; five parks along Highways 1 and 7 (the Liard Highway Loop); and two parks near the towns of Hay River and Fort Smith (South Mackenzie).

The specific campgrounds surveyed in each area were as follows:

Ingraham Trail Area

Fred Henne Campground (82 sites)Blackstone Campground (19 sites)Prelude Lake Campground (30 sites)Fort Providence Campground (32 sites)Reid Lake Campground (28 sites)Fort Simpson Campground (33 sites)Saamba Deh Campground (8 sites)Twin Falls Campground (18 sites)

Inuvik Area

Chuk Campground (38 sites) Nitainilia Campground (24 sites) Happy Valley Campground (30 sites) South Mackenzie Area

Liard Highway Loop


Hay River Campground (22 sites) Queen Elizabeth Campground (19 sites)

This report presents statistical highlights for the four areas surveyed providing information on the size of groups using campgrounds, the ages of persons camping, presence of children, duration of stay at campground, type of sleeping facilities used, previous use of campgrounds, home residence of campers, rating of campgrounds, and activities while using the campgrounds. For campground users from outside the Northwest Territories information is also provided on reasons for visiting the territory, length of stay in the NWT, and number of nights spent in campgrounds.

The results of this survey represent only a portion of total park use in The Northwest Territories. Specifically, this survey does not capture **all** use of territorial parks since: (i) it does not include campers before the starting date for the survey of June 15 or after the survey was finished on September 6; (ii) only over night campground use is examined in this survey and it does not include recreational use of parks during the day; and (iii) only larger parks in the western NWT were included in the survey. Nevertheless. the survey does provide valuable insight into the levels and types of campground usage.



Survey Results

Overall Highlights

Campsite Use

- The results of the summer l 993 campground survey are presented for the following areas: the **Ingraham** Trail Area (three parks); the **Inuvik** Area (three parks); the Liard Highway Loop (five parks); and the South Mackenzie Area (two parks). See Figure 1.
- An estimated 11,691 nights were spent by groups at territorial parks during summer 1993. This figure included 6,111 group nights for the **Ingraham** Trail Area (52%); 2,757 for the **Inuvik** Area (24%); 1,718 for the Liard Highway Loop (15%), and 1,104 for the South Mackenzie Area (9%).
- Non-residents accounted for some 52 percent of territorial park usage (6,086 group nights) while NWT residents accounted for 48 percent (5,605 group nights).



Size of Groups

- The size of groups camping at territorial parks varied by area, with groups at campsites averaging 3.3 persons for the **Ingraham** Trail and **Liard** Highway Loop Areas, 2.7 persons for the South Mackenzie Area, and 2.5 persons for the **Inuvik** Area. Groups of one or two persons accounted for 72 percent of nights spent in **Inuvik** Area campgrounds and 69 percent for the South Mackenzie Area. Corresponding figures for the Liard Highway Loop and **Ingraham** Trail Areas were 56 percent and 45 percent of group nights.
- Looking at residency, NWT campers averaged 3.4 persons per site while the average for non-residents was 2.7 persons. Further, groups of one or two persons accounted for 72 percent of group nights for non-residents compared to just 38 percent for residents.

Age of Campers

•Overall, groups having at least one person 60 years of age or over accounted for 23 percent of campground use. This proportion varied substantially by area ranging from 11 percent of group nights in the **Ingraham** Trail Area to 44 percent for the **Inuvik** Area. Figures for the Liard Highway Loop and South Mackenzie Area were 29 percent and 36 percent of group nights respectively.

•For non-resident campers, some 40 percent of group nights were accounted for by groups with at least one person 60 years of age or over. By contrast, for NWT residents only 5 percent of groups included a person who was 60 years of age or older.

Presence of Children

- Groups with children under 15 year of age occupied 34 percent of campsites overall. As was observed for the age of campers, this figure varied considerably by area. For the Ingraham Trail Area, some 50 percent of group nights were groups with children present. By comparison, for the Inuvik Area just 7 percent of group nights included children. In the Liard Highway Loop groups with children accounted for 27 percent of site use, while for the South Mackenzie Area the figure was 17 percent.
- Groups from the Northwest Territories were much more likely to include children, with 56 percent of sites having children present. For non-territorial campers the figure was 13 percent.

Nights in the Campground

- •Expected length of stay in territorial campgrounds also varied considerably by area. For the **Ingraham** Trail Area, 29 percent of campground use was by groups expecting to stay more than ten nights. For other areas, most sites were occupied by groups expecting to stay just one or two nights 70 percent for the **Inuvik** Area, 80 percent for the South Mackenzie Area, and 95 percent for the Liard Highway Loop.
- •Shorter campground stays were more common for non-resident usage with groups at 4 l percent of sites staying for only one night and 32 percent for two nights. The corresponding statistics for NWT campers were 18 percent of sites occupied by groups planning to stay for one night and 23 percent for two nights.

Sleeping Facilities

- •In all areas, tents were the most common type of sleeping facility accounting for 39 percent of campsite use. Travel trailers were more prevalent than motor homes due to a particularly high rate of use in the **Ingraham** Trail Area. For all other areas, motor homes were more common at campsites than were travel trailers.
- •Use of motor homes was much higher for campsites occupied by non-residents. Here, motor homes accounted for 19 percent of site use compared to 5 percent of group nights for campers from the Northwest Territories.

Previous Stays at the Campground

- Campers at 8 I percent of sites occupied by NWT residents had stayed at the park before. By contrast, 90 percent of usage by non-territorial campers was by groups who had not stayed previously at the park.
- •Previous stays were concentrated in the Ingraham Trail Area (74%) and were lowest for the Inuvik Area (2%). For the other two areas, some 15 percent of camping was by repeat users.

Residency of Campers

- •Persons living outside the Northwest Territories accounted for 52 percent of campsite use at territorial parks.
- •The proportion of campsite use by non-residents varied considerably among the four areas surveyed, ranging from just 2 I percent of group nights in the **Ingraham** Trail Area to a high of 95 percent for the **Inuvik** Area. Non-residents accounted for 79 percent of site use for the Liard Highway Loop and 76 percent for the South Mackenzie Area.

• Some 58 percent of campsite use by non-residents involved campers who lived elsewhere in Canada. These campers accounted for at total of 3,514 group nights, 30 percent of overall usage. The provinces accounting most for the use of territorial parks were Alberta (1,218 group nights), British Columbia (1,086 group nights), and Ontario (66 1 group nights).

•••

• Campers from outside Canada stayed a total of 2,572 nights at territorial parks, some 22 percent of total campsite usage. The proportion of use by non-Canadian residents ranged from just 5 percent of nights in the Ingraham Trail Area to 50 percent for the Inuvik Area. Comparable figures for the South Mackenzie Area and the Liard highway Loop were 36 and 28 percent respectively.




Figure 3 Group Nights by Home Residence

Rating of Campground

- Overall, 89 percent of **groups** at campsites rated the value **they** received for the campground fee as "**good**." Ten-percent **rated** the value as "average" and just I percent as "poor." The proportion rating value for fee as "good" ranged from 97 percent for the **Ingraham** Trail Area to 86 percent for the **Liard** Highway Loop, 79 percent for the **Inuvik** Area and 68 percent for the South Mackenzie Area.
- Campers from the Northwest Territories evaluated campgrounds fees somewhat more favorably than those who were non-residents. Some 95 percent of campsites with NWT residents rated the value received for the campground fee as "good" compared to 84 percent for non-residents.
- Parks facilities and features were also rated positively by users. Particularly high marks were received for the cleanliness of the grounds (93% of sites) and the availability of firewood (91% of sites). High ratings 80% or more sites responding "good" were also observed for the overall condition of facilities, cleanliness of restrooms, control of noise and pets, and the condition of the boat launch. The lowest proportion of "good" responses (7 1 % of group nights) was for number of recreational things to do.
- Non-resident campers tended to provide fewer "good' responses when rating specific features and facilities of the campground. Exceptions were control of pets, cleanliness of rest rooms, and condition of facilities.
- Two features rated much lower by non-residents were the number of recreational things to do rated "good" by 51 percent of sites and the condition of the boat launch which was rated as "good" by 56 percent. For NWT residents, the corresponding statistics were 86 and 88 percent of group nights respectively.

Best Features about Campground

- .Campers were also asked an open-ended question about the best features of the campground. Responses to the question were classified into six categories: (i) proximity of the park to a town or lake; (ii) comments related to campsites specifically; (iii) answers related to the facilities at the campground as a whole; (iv) overall features of the campground; (v) comments about the campground staff; and (vi) other comments.
- .Items mentioned most frequently as best features included responses about the campground generally such as quietness, scenery and cleanliness (53% of sites). The second most frequent type of answer related to campground facilities such as the showers and the availability of firewood (42% of sites).
- There was considerable variability in the best features reported by area. For the Ingraham Trail Area, proximity of the campground to Yellowknife and lakes was most often referred to as a best feature (49% of sites). In the other areas, references to the facilities and features of the campground were most frequent. Campground staff were cited most often in the Intrvik Area (24% of sites).
- •Comparing resident and non-resident campers, overall features of the campground were mentioned most often by both (55% and 52% of sites respectively). However, sites with NWT residents were more likely to mention proximity of the campground to towns or lakes (49%) while non-residents referred more often to the campground facilities (50%).

Features that Should Be Improved

- •Campers were also asked an open-ended question about features of the campground that should be improved. Responses to the question were classified as follows: (i) improvements to existing features; (ii) additional features that were needed; (iii) answers relating to insects; and (iv) staff or administration.
- •Improvements to existing features and additional facilities were mentioned most as things that could be improved (36 and 45% of group nights, respectively). Staff and administration improvements were mentioned by 17 percent of sites, with this response concentrated largely in the Ingraham Trail Area and among NWT residents.

Activities at the Campground

- •Viewing wildlife and hiking were the most common activities by campers at territorial parks reported for 73 percent and 61 percent of group nights respectively,
- •Comparing camping areas, the **Ingraham** Trail Area had the highest participation rate for all activities except hiking viewing the wildlife (82%), swimming (63%), fishing (44%), and boating (37%). Hiking was reported most often for the Liard Highway Loop (72%).
- For NWT residents, 61 percent of sites reported swimming compared to 12 percent for non-residents.

Other Activities Planned While at the Campground

•The most frequent responses to the open-ended question on other activities referred to rest and relaxation, or to visiting and socializing. Responses of this sort were much more frequent for sites in the **Ingraham** Trail Area and for campers from the Northwest Territories. Non-residents were more **likel** y to refer to items such as activities in town and sightseeing.


Parks Living Up to Expectations

•Overall, 95 percent of sites reported that their expectations about the park had been met or exceeded. Less than I percent stated that their stay at the park did not live up to expectations. Non-residents were more likely than N WT campers to report that their expectations had been exceeded (39% versus 16% of group nights).

•Comparing areas, groups with expectations that had been met or exceeded accounted for 98 percent of campsite use for the Ingraham Trail Area, 95 percent for the Liard Highway Loop, 9 I percent for the Inuvik Area, and 87 percent for the South Mackenzie Area.

Additional Information for Non-Resident Users

A series of additional questions were asked of campground users whose home residence was outside the Northwest Territories. These questions included the amount of time they expected to stay in the territory, expenditure patterns, and reasons for visiting.

Reasons for Visiting the Northwest Territories

- For non-resident users of territorial parks, an open-ended question was asked about the main reasons for visiting the Northwest Territories. Responses to this question were coded to seven categories:
 (i) outdoor activities such as fishing or canoeing; (ii) sightseeing; (iii) wanting to see the North; (iv) visiting family or friends; (v) business/looking for work; (vi) cultural/historical; (vii) other reasons including "vacation".
- Wanting to see the North and sightseeing were the two most common reasons reported by non-resident users of the campgrounds—45 percent and 43 percent of group nights respectively.
- Reasons given for visiting the Northwest Territories varied somewhat by area. Wanting to see the North was the most frequent response for sites with non-resident campers in the **Ingraham** Trail (43%) and **Inuvik** Areas (58%) while sightseeing was mentioned most often for the Liard Highway Loop (48%) and the South Mackenzie Area (45%).
- Among the other response categories, visiting family or friends was reported most frequently in the Ingraham Trail Area (22%) as wasbusiness/looking for work (16%). Outdoor activities were reported more frequently for the Liard Highway Loop (32%) and South Mackenzie Area (3070). Cultural or historical reasons were mentioned most often in the Inuvik Area (13%).

Length of Stay in the Northwest Territories

•On average, non-resident groups using territorial campgrounds expected to stay 9.8 nights in the Northwest Territories. This value varied considerably by area.

- The average expected stay in the Northwest Territories reported for the Ingraham Trail Area was 17.5 nights (reflecting the fact that some campground users were using the parks for more than recreation). By comparison, in the **Inuvik** Area the average expected stay was 5.7 nights, with 60 percent of groups at campsites expecting their stay in the territory to be less than five days.
- The average expected stay in the Northwest Territories for non-resident groups at campsites in the Liard Highway Loop was 10.4 nights, while for the South Mackenzie Area the average was 10.3 nights.

Nights Spent in Campgrounds

•Groups at 73 percent of sites with non-territorial campers expected to spend all nights in the Northwest Territories **at** campgrounds. Only, 12 percent of such groups indicated that they were expecting to stay less than half the nights in campgrounds.

Availability of Parks as a Factor in Decision to Visit the Northwest Territories

•Overall, some 44 percent of sites with non-resident groups **indicated** that the availability of parks and campground facilities was a factor in their decision to come to the Northwest Territories. Availability was a somewhat more important for the South Mackenzie Area and the Liard Highway Loop.

Information Obtained Prior to Visiting the Northwest Territories

- Among non-resident users of NWT parks, some 70 percent of sites reported that they had obtained information about territorial parks prior to visiting the Northwest Territories. This statistic did not vary significantly by area except for the Inuvik Area which was somewhat higher at 75 percent of group nights.
- •For groups that had obtained information before visiting the Northwest Territories, the most commonly reported sources were visitor centers (63%) and brochures (62%).
- •The least common source for information about **NWT** parks was the radio or television, reported for only 6 percent of group nights.

- •The 1993 NWT Campground User Survey questionnaire was developed by the Bureau of Statistics in consultation with the Department of Economic Development & Tourism.
- •Funding for survey operations was provided in part by the Department of Economic Development & Tourism.
- •Survey operations were coordinated by the Bureau of Statistics. In the case of the **Ingraham** Trail Area, interviewers were provided by the Bureau of Statistics. In other areas, staff of the campgrounds completed the survey on behalf of the Bureau of Statistics.
- All questionnaires were interviewer administered.
- •A copy of the questionnaire is provided in Appendix B.

Sampling Procedures

- •Sampling procedures were developed based on the need to produce statistically reliable estimates **for** parks in the four areas.
- Sampling rates were 1 in 10 for the **Ingraham** Trail area, 1 in 3 for the **Inuvik** area, and **l** in 2 for the Liard Highway Loop and the South Mackenzie area.
- •Specific campsites chosen to be included in the survey were selected by systematic random sampling based on daily tally sheets completed by the interviewers.

Data Entry & Processing

- •Each questionnaire was reviewed upon receipt and any obvious corrections made. Data entry was completed using a 4thDimension data base developed by the Bureau of Statistics. Statistical tables were prepared using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS).
- Following data entry, computer assisted edits were performed to check for data entry errors and logical consistency among responses.

Questionnaires Received and Sample Weighting

•Questionnaires for some 1,120 groups were included in the statistical file used for the campground user survey report. Weighting of the statistical file was based on the number of group nights by area.
