This report is intended to provide current, reliable visitor information to assist Canadian Heritage staff carry out their management and planning responsibilities.

Attendance statistics are reported on a calendar year basis for the eight year period from 1988 through 1995. National **parks** and historic sites have been organized into the three Integrated Responsibility Centres of the Prairie and Northwest Territories Region: Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Northwest Territories. Appendix A includes the Data Collection Method established for each park and site.

Once again, the following have been included:

a statistical process control technique has been used to identify trends in the attendance data of a number of parks and sites, see Appendix B.

a description of each park and site provides information on visitor programs and services, seasons, hours of operation, etc.

an "Average" column has been included with each attendance table providing an eight year average for each month of. each year

Glossary

Different measuring units are used to collect information on park and site use. These units are defined as follows:

Entry:

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A person enters a park/site, regardless of the purpose of the entry. This number includes entries by service personnel and Parks Canada staff, as well as drive-through traffic.

Visit:

A person enters the park/site for the purpose of heritage appreciation and/or recreation. A reentry by the same person on the same day is not counted as another visit. Similarly, re-entries by visitors staying overnight in the park are not counted as a second visit.

Visit Day:

Each Day or part thereof that a visitor is in a park.

Visit Hour: Each hour or part thereof that a visitor is in a site.

Party Night: Each night a group (party) of people occupies a campsite.

Person Night: Each night an individual occupies-a campsite.

Extension Contacts:

The extension contacts are not included in the figures for the outing, visit, visit day or visit hour categories. They are used to count the number of people that park/site personnel make contact with outside of the park or site.




National Historic Sites Attendance Summary

The house was built by kinsmen, and occupied by his mother, brother and descendants until 1969. The House, a Red River frame building, has been restored to its 1886 appearance.

St. Andrew's Rectory National Historic Site

On west bank of Red River, 25 km N of Winnipeg Tel: (204) 334-6405

St. Andrew's Rectory is an excellent example of mid-1 9th century Red River architecture. Exhibits on the main floor of the rectory interpret Red River architecture, and the roles of the Church Missionary Society and the Church of England in the settlement of the Red River and Western Canada.

York Factory National Historic Sites

240 km southeast *of Churchill* on Hudson Bay; 7 km up the Hayes River from the coast & *150 Km* down river from *Cillam* Tel: (204) 675-8863 Fax: (204) 675-2026 York Factory was oeprated by the Hudson's Bay Company as a depot to receive gods from England and collect and send fur back to Europe. It is accessible by air or by a rigorous canoe trip. Camping is not permitted at York Factory because of the danger of a polar bear attack. There are no stores or services. It is the oldest wooden structure still standing on permafrost.

RIDING MOUNTAIN NATIONAL PARK

Situated amidst a sea of agricultural land, Riding Mountain National Park rises dramatically from the prairie landscape to an elevation of 756 metres above sea level. Forming part of the Manitoba Escarpment, this "island" preserve protects a wide variety of wildlife and vegetation areas. The park has numerous hiking trails, and Agassiz Tower overlooks a panoramic view of prairies stretching out to the north. The park is famous for its large black bears, and there are moose, elk, deer, and wolves. A herd of bison lives in an enclosure of pasture and woods.

THE FORKS NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

The Forks National Historic Site is a celebration of all the peoples who have used this great natural meeting place - aboriginal people, Hudson's Bay Company traders, Nor' Westers, Métis, and others. The site is 5.5 hectares of urban parkland along the Red River, from the Provencher Bridge to the mouth of the Assiniboine River. A series of displays tells the history of The Forks. Beside the historic site is the Forks Market, a traditional marketplace where you can buy anything from aboriginal crafts to this week's groceries. The market is in restored turn-of-the-century railway buildings. Stroll along the river walkways from the Provencher Bridge to the Legislative Building and stand where the Red and Assiniboine meet, or take a boat n-de and see the city from a different perspective.

LOCATION: Junction of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers in downtown Winnipeg; access from Pioneer and Water Avenues.

LENGTH OF TIME FOR A VISIT: 1 hour to 1 day, depending on program or event.



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Churchill, Manitoba

Churchill is Canada's only Arctic seaport. It is accessible only by rail or air. Churchill is known as the world's polar bear capital.

Manitoba North National Historic Sites - Churchill VisitorCentre

Suggested length of visit: Day visitors(15% of the visitors) come to Churchill on the morning train and leave at night, a 12 hour visit; most visitors come for at least 3 days. Many people spend one to six hours at the Churchill visitor Centre

Location: Churchill is in northeastern Manitoba on Hudson Bay, about 1,000 km north of Wimipeg. There are no roads, so most transportation is by scheduled plane service from Winnipeg. The Churchill Visitor Centre is in the Bayport Plaza in central Churchill. Heritage experience: Historical, cultural, natural

Educational and interpretive programs: Churchill Visitor Centre offers a museum, fur trade exhibits, an information centre, and a theatre. Several video productions are available year round, and theatrical plays, puppet shows, and special presentations can be seen in June, July, and August. The theatre holds 45 people.

Other visitor services: Several local tour operators provide bird watching, tundra and town exploration tours, boat transportation, beluga whale watching tours, polar bear and Arctic wildlife tours, Northern Lights viewing, and dog sledding tours.

There is disability access at the Churchill Visitor **Centre**. Hearing assist devices, a regular portable and an **all-terrain** wheel chair are available.

1995 Hours of operation: Churchill visitor Centre: Mid-May to Mid-November; daily, 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. and 6:00 to 9:00 p.m.; Mid-November to mid-May, 9:00 a.m. -12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Special theatre presentations in June, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays; in July and August, Tuesday though Saturday.

Peak season: Bird watching, May and June; whale watching, July and August; polar bear watching, October and November.

Cape Merry National Historic Site is located, two kilometres outside of Churchill. It features a battery built in 1746 to provide added protection for Prince of Wales Fort.

Suggested length of stay: One to two hours

Location: 2 km along the coast road from Churchill; visitors can take a tour bus, a taxi or walk to the Site

Educational and interpretive program: Guided tours are available Tuesday through Sunday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.; in July and August, tours are offered from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Capacity: Parks Canada can accommodate groups of up to 45 people at Cape Merry if



- they are booked in advance. Larger groups can be staggered
- Other visitor facilities: Disabled access
- Hours of operation: Open continuously in June, July and August.

Prince of Wales Fort National Historic Site, located on Eskimo Point on the west side of the Churchill River, is a huge, partially-restored 18th century stone fort. It was established in 1717 as a Hudson's Bay Company post on the Churchill River to trade with the Dene and Inuit.

- . Suggested length of stay: One to two hours
 - Location: Accessible by boat from Churchill
 - Educational and interpretive programs: Guided tours are held Tuesday through Saturday in July and August. These may be **cancelled** due to tides and weather.
 - Capacity: Parks Canada can accommodate groups of up to 45 people if they are booked in advance; larger groups can be staggered.


A further three kilometres up -the churchill River is Sloops Cove National Historic Site, a natural protected harbour for sloops and small vessels. It was here that explorer Samuel Hearne and others carved their names in the nearby rocks. The site can be reached by tour boat in good weather and ideal tide conditions, or by helicopter tour.

Educational and interpretive programs: Book in advance with local boat operators, helicopter companies, and the Parks Canada office. Landings are heavily dependent on weather and tides.

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ST. ANDREWS RECTORY NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE



York Factory National Historic Site

York Factory was operated by the Hudson's Bay Company as a depot to receive goods from England and collect and send fur back to Europe. Accessible by air or by a rigorous canoe trip, it's the oldest wooden structure still standing on permafrost. More than 500,000 artifacts have been uncovered during a 10-year archaeology program.

Location: York Factory, which is extremely isolated, is 240 km southeast of Churchill on Hudson Bay. It is seven kilometres up the Hayes River from the coast, and 150 km down river from Gillam. Most visitors arrive by chartered aircraft, though a three-week canoe trip down the hayes River from Norway House is popular; transportation out can be arranged with chartered aircraft companies. Camping is not permitted at York Factory because of the danger of a polar bear attack. There are no stores or services. Suggested length of stay: One to six hours

Educational and interpretive programs. Tours available with advance booking. 1995 Hours of operation: Open June 1 to mid-September

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

Eavesdrop on a prairie dog town or learn about how Sitting Bull took refuge here after the battle of the Little Bighorn in 1876. Guided hikes, interpretive trails, bird watching, and nature photography are popular activities in Grasslands.

Prince Albert National Park protects a slice of the northern coniferous forest, which plays host to an abundance of wildlife. The park also contains many outstanding natural and cultural features, including the only fully protected white pelican nesting colony in Canada, and the isolated, lakeside cabin of conservationist Grey Owl. Special events and extensive interpretive programming help to make the diverse natural setting of Prince Albert come alive for the visitor. The townsite of Waskesiu located in the park provides extensive services for visitors.

Batoche National Historic Site

Batoche, SK -88 km NE of Saskatoon Tel: (306) 423-6227 Fax: (306) 423-5400 Batoche displays the remains of the village of Batoche on the banks of the South Saskatchewan River. It wasthe last battlefield in the Northwest Rebellion of 1885. Louis Riel selected Batoche as the headquarters of his "Provisional Government of Saskatchewan". Several buildings have been restored within the park. The site depicts the lifestyles of the Métis of Batoche between 1860 and 1900- the trails they walked, their homes, their church, and the Battle of Batoche, May 9-12, 1885. Visitors can also see an award-winning halfhour multi-media show in the site's Visitor Reception Centre.

Fort Battleford National Historic Site

Fort Battleford showcases the role of the North West Mounted **Police** in the Canadian West. The fort was established in 1876 and abandoned in 1924. It offers five original buildings, four with period furniture, showing how the national architecture of the day was adapted to the Canadian west. The stockades and bastions are reconstructed, and the barracks has an interpretive display.

Fort Walsh National Historic Site

55 km *S* W of *Maple* Creek, SKonprovincia/road#271 Tel: (306) 662-3590/2645 Fax: (306) 662-2711 This former North West Mounted Policy/Royal Canadian Mounted Police post (circa 1878-1883) was later used for 26 years (1942-1968) to breed horses for the force and to use in the Musical Ride. Take a guided tour of the fort's buildings, the Fort Walsh townsite, two cemeteries, and a reconstructed whiskey trading post. Visitors can also explore the ridge along Battle Creek on self-guided trails, and view exhibits in the Visitor Reception Centre.

Motherwell Homestead National Historic Site

5 minutes *S* of *Abernethy*, *SK* off Highway 22 Tel: (306) 333-2116 Fax: (306) 333-2210 **Motherwell** Homestead depicts the lifestyles, costumes, and architecture of the early 20th century. Costumed guides give you a glimpse of the life and career of pioneer farmer and politician, W.R. Motherwell, and his significant Influence on the development of scientific agriculture in Western Canada.

GRASSLANDS NATIONAL PARK

You can eavesdrop on a prairie dog town to find out how these little animals thrⁱve in their natural environment at Grasslands National Park. There 's history here, too: Sitting Bull and his Sioux followers took refuge here from the United States Army after the battle of the Little Bighorn in 1876. Grasslands is the first representative of the original mixed-grass prairie ecosystem to be set aside in North America. The dominant vegetation of the 450 square km park (175 square-miles) is retied-grass prairie. The West Block features a glacial meltwater channel, the Frenchman River Valley, with deeply dissected plateaux, coulees, and erosion features. The East Block centres on the Kildeer badlands of the Rock and Morgan Creek areas, representing the Wood Mountain Upland.

LOCATION: Southwestern Saskatchewan, near the Montana border; access by Highway 4 and Highway 18.

DATES & HOURS OF OPERATION: The park is open year round. The Visitor Centre in Val Marie is open daily 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. from Victoria Day in May until Labour Day in September. In the off-season it's open Monday to Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Peak season: April for bird watching; July and August.

LENGTH OF TIME FOR A VISIT: For day use, 1/2 a day; for camping 2 to 3 days.

FACILITIES/SERVICES: Educational and interpretive programs: Park staff offer guided hikes on Sundays in July and August. At other times, Park staff can arrange for a volunteer to accompany groups into the park. There's a self-guided Frenchman River Valley Ecotour brochure, and a self-guided audio cassette tour. No facilities or services are located in the Park. The West Block of the park is accessible by one main dry weather road. Access to the East Block is limited, with only a small part accessible in dry weather. Check with the Visitor Information Centre in Val Marie or the Rodeo Ranch Museum for road conditions and access routes. Campers should register at the Information Centre or the Rodeo Ranch Museum. Primitive camping is permitted away from the road and away from old ranch buildings. Open campfires are not allowed.

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

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



On a trip from Saskatoon to Prince Albert National Park, the landscape gradually changes from poplar bluffs and grain fields to forests of aspen and evergreens. Roads wind through gentle hills, skirting spruce bogs and hugging lake shores. The national park's 400,000 hectares (1 million acres) is host to an abundance of wildlife, including deer, elk, moose, woodland caribou, wolf, lynx, otter, bison, blackbear, and 235 species of birds. On the southern edge of the great northern forest, Prince Albert National Park protects a small slice of the transition zone between parkland and boreal ecosystem. It has one of the few free roaming herds of plains bison in Canada, a colony of 9,000 white pelicans (the second largest in the country), pockets of rare fescue grassland, and the lakeside cabin of Grey Owl, a.k.a. Archie Belaney. You can hike or canoe and portage to Grey Owl's Cabin, the famous one room structure on Ajawaan Lake, where the naturalist, author, and orator lived for seven years with his wife and two beaver companions, Jellyroll and Rawhide.

BATOCHE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

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Batoche National Historic Site displays the remains of the village of Batoche on the banks of the South Saskatchewan River. It was the last battlefield in the Northwest Rebellion of 1885. Batoche, then a community of about 500 people, was the place Métis leader Louis Riel had selected as the headquarters of his provisional government. Several buildings have been restored within the park. The site depicts the lifestyles of the Métis of Batoche between 1860 and 1900- the trails they walked, their homes, their church, and the Battle of Batoche, May 9-12, 1885. You can still see segments of the trenches used during the Rebellion's climatic battle.



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FORT BATTLEFORD NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

Fort Battleford National Historic Site showcases the role of the North West Mounted Police in the Battleford district and in the Canadian west. The fort was established in 1976 and abandoned in 1924. It offers five original NWMP buildings, four with period furniture, showing how the national architecture of the day was adapted to the Canadian west. It depicts the Commanding Officer's residence and the officers' quarters. The stockade and bastions are reconstructed, and the barracks includes an interpretive display.

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

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FORT WALSH NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

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Near the Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park is Fort Walsh National Historic Site. The Fort was built in 1875 by the North West Mounted Police, and abandoned in 1883. The Mounted Police were sent in to stope the illegal American whiskey trade, and mediate with the Sioux who had followed Chief Sitting Bull across the Canadian border after the Battle of Little Big Horn. From 1942 to 1968 the Mounted Police bred horses here, including those used in the world famous Musical Ride. The fort is under restoration to the 1882 period; and FarWell's trading post has been reconstructed and furnished to 1872 period.





Many species of fish, birds, and mammals have also been observed in the park. Nahanni offers the adventurous visitor a once-in-a-life-time experience with nature at its best. A large new Visitor Centre in Fort Simpson features extensive displays on the history, culture, and geography of the area.

Designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Wood Buffalo is an excellent example of boreal forest with meandering streams, shallow lakes, and large gypsum cliffs. The park's unusual geography also yields one of North America's most extensive landscapes of sinkholes, underground rivers, caves, and sunken valleys. It is also home to two thousand bison, the largest free-roaming herd in the world. Visitors can experience this rare and wonderful wilderness through such interpretive activities as bison creeps and salt plains walks.


Aulavik National Park is a 12,225 square kilometre wilderness area situated on northern Banks Island, N. W. T., the most westerly island in the Canadian Arctic Archipelago. The closest settlement to the park, and the only settlement on Banks Island, is Sachs Harbour, some 250 kilometres to the southwest of the southern park boundary. Inuvialuit from Sachs Harbour retain all subsistence hunting, trapprng, and fishing rights within the park boundaries. Inuvik, some 700 kilometres south of the park, acts as the regional gateway to Aulavik. With the possible exception of cruise ship visits, most visitors would make their way to Aulavik via charter aircraft from Inuvik. There are no facilities or services offered within Aulavik National Park.

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AUYUITTUO NATIONAL PARK RESERVE

Auyuittuq translates to "the land that never melts". Auyuittuq is known for it's high peak mountains as the Switzerland of the North. This spectacular park reserve is an arctic wilderness of jagged mountain peaks, deep valleys, steep-walled ocean fiords and eternal glacier ice. At the heart of the park is the massive Penny Ice Cap, whose radiating valley glaciers are still actively shaping the land. The glaciers flow down into the surrounding treeless valleys, where they melt in to swift rivers that rush over the rock and tundra valley floors to the ocean. Here, at the Arctic Circle, winter gives way to the brief arctic summer while darkness and daylight take turns dominating the land. This powerful landscape reflects the inuit belief that time is infinite and unending.



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

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ELLESMERE ISLAND NATIONAL PARK RESERVE

Ellesmere Island national park Reserve is the world's most northerly national park. During the brief arctic summer, the sun remains high in the sky, bathing the land in continuous daylight. There are no trees. The scale of the land is both immense and intimate. Glaciers on a mountainside, fifteen kilometres away, seem to be within reach. Animals in the park are unafraid of people. Long-tailed jaegers may hover in front of you, while caribou approach closely. The signs of men and women are still clearly evident even though some are 4,000 years old. A stone fox trap, a tent ring and scattered remains of the equipment of a North Pole exploration all speak of the courage and the adventurous spirit of those who first came to this solitude at the top of the world. Ellesmere is a polar dessert, with an annual precipitation of only 6 cm. The park is home to Arctic hares and wolves, muskox and Peary caribou. Thirty species of birds nest in the area during the summer. This includes arctic terns, ringed plovers, ruddy turnstones and red knots.

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NAHANNI NATIONAL PARK RESERVE

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Established in 1973, Nahanni National Park Reserve was the first area in Canada to be officially designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The South Nahanni River is one of North Amen''ca 's wildest and most spectacular river, and has been designated a Canadian Heritage River. It rushes 322 km through the long, narrow park in the southwest comer of the territories. Four great canyons, in places up to 1,200 meters deep, line the river. At Virginia Falls, the Nahanni plunges twice the height of Niagara Falls in a breathtaking cascade of unsurpassed beauty. At Rabbitkettle Hotsprings, water of 20 degrees Celsius radiates outward to form a terraced mount of tufa rock more than 27 meters high. Near the springs, wild orchids bloom next to snow. Chartered float planes from Fort Simpson, Blackstone Landing or Fort Liard provide access to the park. The river contains at least 13 species of fish, and more than 120 species of birds and 40 species of mammals have been observed in the park, including moose, caribou, sheep, bear, and deer.



FACILITIES/SERVZCES: Heritage values and unique experiences: River running, using canoes, rafts, and kayaks; hiking (most hiking routes are accessible only from the river corridor); visitors may also fly to Virginia Falls, with its 100 metre cascade, via float-equipped aircraft; most charter companies allow about two hours for the hike to the bottom of the falls; for those venturing beyond the river, the park features sulphur hotsprings, mountain ranges, alpine tundra, and forests of spruce and aspen; four outfitters are licensed to operate in the park. Few developed facilities; visitors carry shelter and food in their canoes or backpacks; two designted campsites - at Rabbitkettle Lake and Draus' Hotspring; random camping is permitted.

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Appendix B: Trend Analysis

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TREND ANALYSIS

Statistical process control methods have been used to identify statistically significant trends in the 8 years of attendance data -1988 to 1995.

In order to adjust for normal year to year fluctuations average attendance has been calculated for subgroups of three consecutive years of attendance data for each park or site. These averages has been plotted on Variable Control Graphs which contain a "grand average" and upper and lower "control limits".

Upward or downward trends and other significant changes were found in many cases and are described beside the specific graph. National parks are listed first in alphabetical order, followed by national historic sites.


